An evening walk around Pelican Pointe

Encounters with the Bad and the Worse, and with the Good, the Better and the Best

The Bad: Strolling northward down the slope toward Fairmount Drive, I noted a BMW in the parking bay between buildings AA and BB. What motivates such actions--mere selfishness, rampant egotism or overpowering laziness? Only the perpetrators know.

The Good. I completed my 360-degree stroll. From across the street to my unit, I reveled in the sight of a large, beautiful tree, still brightened by the last sunlight.

I walked across to the tree and stood under it, enthralled by its reach and colors.

The Better. Migrant Painted Lady butterflies, still hardy, still active, performed acrobatics around the blossoms of a nearby bush, fanned their painted wings up and down, then spread them parallel to the ground, as if to rest. I was not the only witness to the spectacle. A ladybug, roly-poly, slow, and beauteous in its own right, ambled across the sidewalk to its refuge in the grass, where it could feast on aphids, to the benefit of Pelican Pointe greenery.

The Best. A hawk, which I could not identify in the lowering dusk, sped westward above my head, along the same flyway which I have seen other hawks use before, the airspace between my building and the one opposite. Silently, the hawk banked to the southwest when it reached the street, banked again, westward to the large green area across the street... and disappeared. Out of sight, but not out of mind. My evening could not have ended better. ###

Safety reminder to check your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms

The life expectancy of smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors is generally around ten years after which time their sensors can begin to lose sensitivity. The test button only confirms that the battery, electronics and alert systems are working. It doesn't mean the smoke sensor is working. It is recommended that the entire unit be removed and replaced with a new model. If you have replaced batteries but still get a chirping sound, you may want to hire an electrician to inspect and replace your smoke alarms as needed. ###

Resident and guest parking reminders

All residents are encouraged to review the <u>Pelican Pointe Association's rules</u>, page 4, regarding parking in our community: Email questions to <u>jean@weststarmanagement.com</u>.

- Each Residence is served by a minimum of two garage spaces, and all vehicles belonging to an Owner must be kept in the garage when not in use.
- Guests of an Owner, other than family members who reside with an Owner, may park only in identified parking spaces (visitor parking) for up to 72 hours, or temporarily with prior approval of the HOA board.
- No Owner may keep at the Property more vehicles than available garage spaces.
- No house trailer, camping trailer, horse trailer, hauling trailer, boat or boat accessories, camper, pickup truck-camper shell combination incapable of being housed in a garage, truck larger than one ton, recreational vehicle or equipment, mobile home or commercial vehicle may be parked or stored anywhere within the Property.
- Garage door shall be closed when not in use.
- No abandoned, unlicensed, wrecked or inoperable vehicles of any kind shall be stored or parked within the Property except in garages or except in emergencies.
- Vehicle washing and waxing is allowed only outside the garage of the vehicle Owner's unit. No other vehicle repairs or maintenance shall be permitted.
- Do not park a vehicle in front of garage door or in garage access drive. ###


